Atlanta is also a relatively young city, with a median age of 36 among its nearly six million residents.

The Atlanta Botanical Garden has 30 acres full of beautiful plant displays, and since opening in 1976, it has become a welcomed destination for residents. Even more, Zoo Atlanta is located a few minutes from the downtown area. Home to animals from across the world, it is a special place for any animal lover or family to visit.


### Getaways, Sports & Entertainment





If you need a break from city life, Atlanta is situated well within range of a number of beautiful rural regions. The Great Smoky Mountain National Park is within driving distance, making it a perfect location for a quick weekend getaway. And for those with an affection for the ocean, beachfront locations in Georgia and Florida are a brief flight from the city.

Atlanta is home to a number of popular sports teams, including the Atlanta Braves (MLB), Atlanta Hawks (NBA) and the Atlanta Falcons (NFL). Collegiate sports are also popular, with Georgia Tech housing the oldest on-campus division one football stadium. The city also holds the Chick-fil-A College Football Hall of Fame, which is an interesting day trip for any football fan.
