Living in Boise is slightly more expensive than the national average, for both buying and renting, but it's one of the cheapest metropolitan areas to live in the Pacific Northwest when compared to other large cities like Seattle and Portland. The weather in central Idaho is milder than other western cities. Average temperatures range from around 77 degrees Fahrenheit in summer to around 32 degrees Fahrenheit in winter.

In Boise, the emphasis restaurateurs place on local sourcing is no joke. It's the reason why locals and visitors alike love spots such as Cottonwood Grille that use local items like beef, beer and wine on their menu. For those who love breakfast, the trip just outside city limits to Terri's Café located in Meridian is also highly recommended for its use of local, fresh flavors. If a more sophisticated dining experience is what you're in the mood for -Chandler's Steakhouse is a winner in anyone's book with live jazz and an extensive wine list.





Boise hosts over 50 annual festivals, but a few that stand out include the city's Alive After 5: Free Summer Concert Series, Boise Entrepreneur Week and Art in the Park. Culturally, Boise is a historic gold rush town. Before that, the Boise Valley was known as a gathering place for a multitude of Native American peoples. This rich history can be explored through walking tours and at the Idaho State Museum.

Looking for reasons to get outside? There are more than 95 parks located in Boise for you to choose from! The Ridge to Rivers trail system is a popular pick for hikers, runners, cyclists and equestrians. Not only do you have over 210 miles of land to discover, but the landscape is always changing with each new season so it's a different experience every time you go. The Boise River is also a fun way to spend the day if you love to boat, fish or waterski.

While there may not be any major league sports teams in Boise, you can find many locals cheering on the Idaho Horsemen (NAL), Idaho Steelheads (ECHL) and Boise State University Broncos! The university is located within city limits, so it's worth catching a quick football, soccer or basketball game.
