Miami is home to a variety of neighborhoods, with ample choices for deciding where to set your roots. Founded in 1873, **Coconut Grove** is one of the more well-known Miami neighborhoods. Despite its location – right in the middle of Miami – the area is known for its relaxing vibe. Bordered by the Biscayne Bay, "The Grove" was named the **safest place to live** in the Miami metropolitan area, holding strong with its lowest crime rate. With an **average home value of \$737,714**, the neighborhood attracts younger families, older empty nesters and singles who appreciate the fact that the majority of its housing is close to the waterfront.

Less than 4 miles away from The Grove lies the Miami neighborhood of **Coral Gables**. The area is filled with European vibes and its architecture provides a wow factor. A step back from the hustle and bustle of downtown, Coral Gables is home to <u>8 public schools, 1 charter school and 20 private schools</u>. The median home value is \$846,100 and the <u>average rent price is around \$1,693</u>.

Last but certainly not least is **Downtown Miami**. With a healthy combination of lofts, high-rise condos and other residential options, the <u>median home value holds tight</u> <u>at \$317,700</u> with average rent running \$1,183. The area is known for great rental and investment opportunities for first-time homeowners. While there are lots of newer living options, there are also a variety of fixer-uppers available.

Miami-Dade County Public Schools coordinate a combination of 392 schools, 345,000 students and 40,000 employees, making it the nation's fourth largest district. The system ranks 21st statewide with an **overall Niche grade of B+.** The student-teacher ratio is 19:1 and more than half of all students are proficient in math and reading.

MiamiEater.com recently published a list of **38 popular area restaurants**. At the top of the list is **Makota**, a restaurant that combines Japanese cuisine with a 21st century flair. Choose from items such as watermelon ceviche, crispy brussels sprouts, ramen and Wagyu steak. Ringing in as the runner-up is **The Surf Club Restaurant**, which boasts nostalgic American cuisine with a traditional Keller flare. Its impressive selection of vintages and robost martini menu align perfectly with the old-school feel of the restaurant and its traditional food selection. There's also **Mandolin Aegean Bistro**, known as one of the best places to enjoy Greek and Turkish food in the city. Try one of the elegant small plates or entrees like lamb and beef meatballs. Top it all off with a glass of refreshing Greek wine to end the evening.

<u>For the sports fans</u> out there, Miami is home to a number of pro teams including the <u>Heat</u>, <u>Marlins</u>, <u>Dophins</u> and <u>Florida</u> <u>Panthers</u> and even an incoming pro soccer team owned by international legend David Beckham. And don't forget to check out all the collegiate athletics action with the 16 varsity teams of the <u>Miami Hurricanes</u>.

The <u>Miami Zoo</u> is one of the area's best <u>family-friendly entertainment options</u>. For all the shopping your heart desires, make a trip to <u>Bayside Marketplace</u> or Ocean Drive. Visit Miami's Cuban heart in <u>Little Havana</u>, which has a variety of art galleries, restaurants, walk-up cafés serving Cuban coffee, and Maximo Gomez Park ... known as Domino Park by the locals who spend their days playing dominos and talking politics.

Miami also offers a beautiful, expansive coastline. Choose from any of <u>Miami's top beaches</u>: Lummus Park Beach, South Pointe Park Pier, Surfside, Haulover Beach, Sunny Isle Beach and more. Whether you're sunbathing, shopping or trying the local cuisine, you're sure to stay busy in these Florida hot spots.

FORT LAUDERDALE LIVING





Located just 28 miles north of Miami, the comfortable city of **Fort Lauderdale** lies on Florida's southeastern coast. More than **180,000 call Fort Lauderdale home**, and the area's cost of living is competitive compared to other popular cities in Florida.

The area is home to some of the finest **neighborhoods** in South Florida. Perhaps the area's best-kept secret, **Harbor Beach** is an immaculate subdivision located just off Seabreeze Boulevard, which borders the Atlantic Ocean. For locally sourced meats and seafood, check out **Terra Mare** and its selection ranging from prime steaks to snacks and small plates sure to please. You can't go wrong by visiting any of J.E.Y. Hospitality Group's popular spots including **TacoCraft**, **PizzaCraft**, **Rok:Brgr** and **Henry's** Sandwich Station.

In and around the area, you'll find many excellent options for a **<u>night on the town</u>**. Located north of downtown is **Lauderdale-by** the-Sea, home to 101 Ocean, one of the region's top restaurant and bars. Farther north along the coast, you'll find the popular 26° Brewing in Pompano Beach. You can also enjoy downtown Fort Lauderdale's many entertainment options, ranging from 33rd Street Wine Bar and American Social to "America's best outdoor party" at America's Backyard.

Award-winning beaches abound near Fort Lauderdale, each providing a clean, safe atmosphere for beachgoers. Greater Fort Lauderdale's northernmost option, **Deerfield Beach**, offers covelike shoreline and a fun playground for the kids. Nestled between Miami and Fort Lauderdale, the Floridian city of **Hollywood** is well known for its coastal location, suburban feel, mixed workforce of white- and blue-collar jobs, and family-friendly focus.

With a **population of 152,000** residents and more than 30 **neighborhoods**. Hollywood is the 12th largest community in Florida. With commute times averaging around 28 minutes across the Miami metropolitan area, many professionals with families find themselves living in the Diplomat Parkway / Washington Street corridor, a suburban locale primarily comprised of medium to large single-family homes with a unique blend of urban sophisticates. A short distance away, <u>North Miami Senior High School</u> is popular for its athletics program and low student-teacher ratio.
