Bradford Beach, 10 minutes outside the city along the shore of Lake Michigan, is also a popular destination for families and lake dwellers. Milwaukee is home to the Milwaukee Bucks (NBA), Milwaukee Brewers (MLB), Milwaukee Admirals (AHL) and the Milwaukee Wave (MASL). While there is no NFL team native to the city, you can catch locals cheering on the Green Bay Packers and taking the two-hour drive up to Lambeau Field.





Broadway tours frequently pass through the Marcus Performing Arts Center on Milwaukee's North Water Street, which also hosts art galleries and music events. If you're looking for an educational day trip, be sure to check out the Milwaukee Public Museum, which holds five million artifacts, or the Mitchell Park Domes, which allow patrons to step inside three different man-made biomes.
